The Commander's Message

First, I'd like to express my appreciation to all those who participated at last month's Port Washington Yacht Club and Safe Harbor Capri Marina events. Community-based events like these are becoming more and more important as we are seeing a decline in member referrals from the national organization. These "Meet & Greets" provide a unique opportunity in which we can raise awareness of America's Boating Club by sharing valuable information with our local boating community. Taking a one-two punch approach, we are following these introductory meetings with a series of six seminars that we believe will also be of value. Boaters are welcome to take all seminars or just those of personal interest. From here, we will determine if there's an appetite for our greater time commitment courses. Next, I'd like to share a recent boating experience I had as a guest, alongside five others, on another Bayside member's boat. Immediately after leaving the dock, no sooner than taking fenders and lines in, blue lights appeared to port. A Coast Guard high speed response boat with a half dozen armed personnel requested to board. After two officers boarded, I did what any wise Commander would do in a situation like this, abandon ship. Glancing towards the Coast Guard helmsman, "Permission to board?" I requested and was welcomed on their vessel. When offered a tour of their boat, I responded, "No time, this should be quick. There's more boating safety knowledge and experience on these two boats than in the rest of the sound. They're all United States Power Squadrons officers having taken every course from safety certificate to celestial navigation". They snickered, likely only eager to put their two fellow officers though another checklist, which in the end, confirmed that all the safety equipment previously verified in a Vessel Safety Check was on board. With all boxes on their form checked, we were on our way, else we would have been headed back to the dock. Vessel Safety Checks payoff.

I'm looking forward to seeing everyone on the 18th at our next General Meeting.

Executive Officer's Report

Amid the ongoing uncertainties of these times, it's tempting to let our imaginations wander into a wistful and utopian world where there are no pandemics, where the concerns of one's society become simplified by a focus on the family unit's sustenance, where boating activities are the central pillar of the family unit's and societal success, where there is such an abundance of resources from the sea that seasonal migration of fish enable villagers along Long Island Sound to merely scoop up with a net all manner of fish and bread loaf-sized clams at the seashore, where critical resources are not wasted and where the needs of society are in complete harmony with our environment[§]...

Strangely, what many don't know is that this *was* the reality of Long Island Sound living only a little over 200 years ago (only 10 generations), when the allure of this "Mediterranean" paradise of the West led explorers, merchants, and waves of colonists to settle in this area. Of course, the inevitable was to occur – natural resources previously relied upon by indigenous peoples were exploited for commercial gain, the rapid growth of populations strained the land, the byproducts of the industrial revolution and human waste contaminated the rivers draining into the Sound and, yes, the first pandemics were introduced into this new frontier, where indigenous residents of the North East, numbering in the tens of thousands, were decimated by the introduction of infectious diseases bought into the New World by settlers. As the staggering pace of population growth continued, uncontrolled pollution began to asphyxiate the Sound to the point where certain species of fish have disappeared, where the natural habitats of migratory marine animals have been disrupted and where even the food chain upon which humans rely has also become threatened. Fortunately, because of the work emanating from partnerships between conservationists and local, state, and federal government, awareness of this crisis has been brought to the fore and, in the last 1-2 generations, significant strides have been made to stem this tide of environmental destruction.

America's Boating Club^{*}, as the preeminent educational organization fostering a mission of "…improving maritime safety and enjoyability through education…" is in a unique position to support the safety of our mariners as well as the "safety" of our waterways. So, let's now imagine what we can resolve to do to assist in *reclaiming* the health of Long Island Sound and, on a what we, as some of the most devoted stewards of our waterways, upwards of 45,000^{*} members strong distributed among 450 squadrons^{*} across the United States and its territories, can accomplish in returning our local and national waterways to their natural state.




