

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Educational Officer's Report

Lt/C Mary Ann Jordan,

The Marine Navigation Course is winding up with a final virtual meeting on Thursday evening, March 31. Then the students will be completing the take-home final exam that includes charting a cruise in Bowditch Bay. The ABC Course is underway and should finish early in April. Certainly presenting courses virtually since the pandemic has created a steep learning curve for our instructors. Perhaps with Covid currently waning in the US, we will be able to offer in person or blended courses (some sessions virtual; some sessions face to face). Educationally, USPS, including Bayside, finds itself in a new world.

Another sign of a changing future is found in the report of March 26, 2022 appearing in the San Francisco News about an 83 year old solo sailor setting out to voyage non-stop from San Francisco to Osaka, Japan. The sailor, Kenichi Horie, estimates the trip will take two and a half months. He is sailing in a 19 foot sailboat, *Mermaid III*, made of aluminum and weighing a paltry 2,182 pounds. The boat has been designed to accommodate Horie's size. He is 5 feet tall. Such a small boat does not leave much room for amenities or much equipment. Fortunately, this trip is not Horie's first solo sail. Those of us who have taken JN and SN have planned a passage from the West Coast of the US to Hawaii. We have learned about the size of the swells in the Pacific as well as the water temperature. We have also seen the estimates indicating that the winds can be quite strong. All of these calculations make Horie's boat seem small indeed.

In 1962, sixty years ago, Kenichi Horie, at the age of 23, set out from Osaka to sail solo in a small wooden boat, *Mermaid*, to San Francisco, a journey of 5,300 miles. He completed the trip in 94 days. Korie had broken a Japanese law by sailing out into the Pacific without permission and of more consequence, his passport had not arrived before he left, When he arrived in California, he had no passport, no money and spoke very little English. At first he was arrested and jailed. When the Mayor of San Francisco heard about his sailing accomplishment and his subsequent reception upon arrival in the US, he granted him a 30 day visa and gave him the key to the city as a reward for bravery. His voyage was the first solo, non-stop sail across the Pacific. After his trip, Korie wrote a book titled *Alone on the Pacific* that was made into a movie nominated for a Golden Globe Award. The original *Mermaid* is displayed in the San Francisco Maritime National Historical Park Museum. Now sixty years later, he has set out again on a boat of a similar size to the original *Mermaid* that he initially sailed on his maiden voyage across the Pacific.

To put Horie's voyage in perspective, I reported last Fall on another long distance solo sailor, Jerome Rand, who sailed around the world on a 32 foot boat that sounded pretty smaill to me, but it weighed in at around 6 times more than the *Mermaid*. What's more,Rand was half the age of Korie on his present sail. Not only does Korie perform the amazingly brave and difficult feat of sailing solo nonstop thousands of miles numerous times, but he also sails on environmentally friendly crafts made of recyclable materials such as aluminum cans, beer kegs and whiskey barrels. Horie too makes use of clean energy: A solar powered boat made of recycled beer cans carried him from Hawaii to Japan and another boat propelled by foot pedals brought him from Hawaii to Okinawa. His longest sail, from Salinas, Ecuador to Tokyo on a solar powered boat put him in the Guinness World Record for the fastest crossing of the Pacific using solar power. None was quite as amazing as his trip on the Suntory Mermaid II, a wave-powered boat with movable fins mounted on the bows of a catamaran. It was capable of propelling the boat forward from the movement of the waves no matter from which direction they were coming. Such a craft owes its propulsion to a readily available source of free energy leaving no carbon footprint and requiring no storage system. This seems a further step forward toward sustainable energy that I reported on last Spring. That report highlighted the replacement of fossil fuel powered engines by electric engines using solar power to charge the batteries.

Looking at Kenichi Horie's current solo voyage, we see that many more people are living longer in the 21st century and also continuing to lead active, productive lives. We see more possibilities in the use of renewable energy, all of which may be reasons for optimism.



Administrative Officer's Report

A great day trip this spring is the Long Island Maritime Museum, 88 West Avenue, Sayville NY.

The Museum's mission is to preserve Long Island's maritime history and heritage for educational purposes; to purchase, collect, restore and preserve boats, vessels and related equipment having to do with past and present maritime activities of Long Island, including shipbuilding, whaling, shell fishing, commercial and sport fishing, wild fowling, pleasure and

competitive boating, watercraft and ethnic heritage; to restore, preserve, interpret, display and exhibit watercraft of historical interest, models of ships and small craft, tools and implements of the maritime crafts and trades, wild fowling decoys, paintings, prints, maps, charts, and books, and displays featuring wildlife.

The Museum was founded in 1966. First called the Suffolk Marine Museum, it was dedicated to the collection and preservation of artifacts of the maritime history of Long Island. Long Island has, since our nation's beginning, been deeply involved in its maritime history. Native Americans, followed by settlers from New England, immigrants from Europe and suburbanites from New York City, have fished, harvested shellfish, gone whaling and built ships and boats on its shores.

Today, pleasure boating is one of Long Island's largest industries. With this rich heritage as a foundation, the Museum, located on the Great South Bay, opened its doors to the public on May 1, 1968. The Museum received its charter from the New York State Board of Regents in November 1983. The Board of Trustees, in cooperation with the Suffolk County Department of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation, developed a collection of vessels, historic buildings, machinery and artifacts. In 1993, support from Suffolk County ceased and operations were privatized under the corporate identity, Long Island Maritime Museum and the Museum's charter was amended to reflect a name change to the Long Island Maritime Museum. This change reflected the expansion of the Museum's focus and audience to include all of Long Island.

The museum honors our region's rich nautical heritage and the role of Long Island in our national maritime story. Whether it's boat building, shipwrecks, shellfish harvesting or recreational boating that captures your imagination, it's all in the museum, the galleries and at the many featured events and programs. Young and old alike will discover the links between the Island's maritime and natural histories and will encounter some of the amazing creatures living in our local waters.

Administrative Officer's Report

Today, a full-time staff of full and part-timers and a dedicated volunteer force successfully operate the Museum and its programs. Many of the maintenance and restoration projects have been adopted by volunteers, under staff supervision, as educational programs.

The museum schedules several educational programs for both adults and children throughout the year. Upcoming programs include on April 3, a program entitled "Beebe Boat Yard: Its History & Surf Boats" will be given by Commander Timothy R. Dring, USNR (Retired). On Sunday, April 10, the museum will feature a program entitled "Birds of Long Island" given by Steve D'Amato. On May 1, the museum will present a program entitled "America's First Freedom Rider" with book signing by lecturer and author Jerry Mikorenda.

The museum plans to hold the annual seafood festival at the end of August and the traditional Halloween boat burning in October.

The museum also presents several children's activities, such as Story Time by the Bay on Thursdays for children ages 3-6 which includes storytelling on the deck with a scavenger hunt to follow. During spring break, from April 18 through April 22, the museum is presenting five different programs including wildlife and birding programs for children from 1st to 5th grades.

The museum is open Mondays through Saturdays from 10 am to 4 pm and Sundays from noon to 4 pm. Admission is \$8 for adults and \$6 for children and seniors.

You can also go for a sail on the sloop Priscilla. Priscilla worked as an oyster dredge from 1888 to 1963 and has been beautifully restored. The Long Island Maritime Museum offers both public and private charters that depart from Oakdale. Each two-hour sail is guided by a Licensed Captain and volunteer crew and includes a narrative depicting Priscilla's fascinating history.
