

Executive Officer's Report

A frequently overlooked requirement for maintaining effective communication capabilities while underway are codified in federal regulations (33 CFR 26) and described in an appendix to the Navigation Rules and Regulations Handbook (the Vessel Bridge-to-Bridge Radiotelephone Regulations^{*}).

These regulations necessitate that: every power-driven vessel of \geq 20 meters in length while navigating; every vessel of \geq 100 gross tons carrying one or more passengers for hire while navigating; every towing vessel of \geq 26 feet while navigating; and every dredge and floating plant engaged in or near a channel or fairway in operations likely to restrict or affect navigation of other vessels except for an unmanned or intermittently manned floating plant under the control of a dredge must have a radiotelephone on board capable of operations from the navigational bridge or main control station and be capable of transmitting and receiving navigational information in the standard channels occupying the frequency range of maritime VHF transmissions (i.e. 156-162 MHz), inclusive of channel 22A (157.1 MHz). Specific geographic areas in the United States (e.g., the lower Mississippi River) are assigned specific frequencies for communications while transiting these areas.

In addition to the radiotelephone requirements noted above, each of the above-referenced vessels must, while transiting any waters within a Vessel Traffic Service (VTS) Area, have on board a radiotelephone capable of transmitting and receiving on the VTS-designated frequency. These frequencies are specified in the Navigation Rules and, for the New York Maritime Traffic Area, include channels 11, 12, or 14, depending upon the specific areas of Lower New York or Raritan Bay being transited and the state of the vessel (i.e., underway or at anchor). *These regulations specifically note that a single VHF radio with scanning or sequential monitoring of channels (i.e., "dual watch) does not meet the requirements for having two radios that can simultaneously maintain a listening watch on the appropriate channels.* Except when transiting the Great Lakes, the person required to maintain a listening watch must be capable of communicating in the English language (33 USC 1204). On the navigable waters of the United States, in addition to any VTS-designated frequencies (while within a VTS area), Channel 13 (156.65 MHz) is the designated frequency to be monitored by the above-described vessels.

Recreational boaters who might find themselves transiting a high-volume maritime traffic lane managed by Vessel Traffic Services, even if not specifically subsumed under these regulations, would, nonetheless, be prudent to familiarize themselves with those channels designated by the area's VTS for communication with larger vessels. This information could become important in the event a navigational hazard affecting your boat was to develop where communication with the VTS or bridge of a larger vessel might be necessary.

In addition, Bayside will make presentations on the main dock at the Port Washington Yacht Club In-Water Boat Show on Saturday, June 4 from 12—5PM. The three topics centered on boat safety are: *Using Dock Lines & Fenders; Staying Safe on the Sound;* and, *Knots to Know*. Concurrently vessel examiners will be onsite performing complimentary Vessel Safety Checks to ensure boats comply with state and federal boating laws and are given a decal to that effect. Similar presentations are scheduled for Safe Harbor Capri East Marina on June 18 from

11AM—1PM and Safe Harbor Capri West Marina on June 25 from 11AM—1PM.

As the weather in the Fall turns cooler and off the water activities increase, Bayside will offer Advanced Marine Navigation as a blended course, virtual and in-person, in September.

PRINCE HENRY ATTENDS BAYSIDE'S CHANGE OF WATCH

As Commander Seth Cirkin announced in the last issue of the Running Lights, Bayside won the Prince Henry the Navigator award in 2022. As Seth mentioned, the Prince Henry award has been presented annually to the squadron with the largest ratio of members having achieved advanced grades in the previous calendar year.

The Price Henry award is an alabaster replica of the statue that Portugal presented to the United States. The statuette itself is very impressive, and we were pleasantly surprised to discover that Prince Henry himself attended our wonderful Change of Watch at the Douglaston Club on May 1, 2022.

This award made me – and probably others – wonder "Who was Prince Henry and why is he so special?

Dom Henrique of Portugal (1394-1460), better known as Prince Henry the Navigator, was the fourth child of Portuguese King John I. Henry was a central figure in the early days of the Portuguese Empire and European maritime discoveries and expansion. He was regarded as the main initiator of what would be known as the Age of Discovery.



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Prince Henry earned his title 'the Navigator' because he assembled a learned group of designers and maritime experts to design new ships, maps, and navigational instruments. Under Henry's direction, a new and much lighter ship, the caravel, was developed.

With the caravel, Portuguese mariners freely explored uncharted waters around the Atlantic, from rivers and shallow waters to transoceanic voyages. (Although the lateen sail on the caravel allowed sailing

upwind to some extent, Portuguese mariners sailing to the Canary Islands and West Africa would still sail far to the northwest before turning northeast near the Azores islands and finally east to Europe in order to have largely following winds for their full journey. Christopher Columbus used this method on his transatlantic voyages.)

Some biographers have also credited Henry with the perfection of a critical navigational instrument called the astrolabe. The mariner's astrolabe was an important navigational tool for finding latitude by measuring the height of the sun or a star above the horizon.

Henry then funded expeditions to use this knowledge to sail the High Seas and

explore the West African coast. Building up a massive body of maritime knowledge with each expedition, Henry oversaw the first stages of a process that gained the Portuguese a global empire.

In addition to sponsoring exploratory voyages, Henry is also credited with furthering knowledge of geography, mapmaking, and navigation. He started a

school for |navigation in Sagres, at the southwestern tip of Portugal, where he employed cartographers, shipbuilders, and instrument makers.

During Prince Henry's time and after, the Portuguese navigators discovered and perfected the North Atlantic volta do mar (the 'turn of the sea' or 'return from the sea'): the dependable pattern of trade winds blowing largely from the east near the equator and the returning westerlies in the mid-Atlantic. This was a major step in the history of navigation, when an understanding of oceanic wind patterns was crucial to Atlantic navigation, from Africa and the open ocean to Europe, and enabled the main route between the New World and Europe in the North Atlantic in future voyages of discovery.

Prince Henry sponsored explorations that accomplished much for Portugal. Not only did his expeditions succeed in mapping much of the coast of west Africa, they also succeeded in spreading Christianity, defeating the Ottomans, and establishing new trade routes.

For most of the latter part of his life, Henry concentrated on his maritime activities and court politics.

So, it seems that Prince Henry's contributions to sailing are quite impressive, and after learning about him, we should be even more honored to display his award!





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
