## Executive Officer's Report

Spring commissioning is quickly approaching! As we eagerly consider those lists of items that we want to attend to, this is also an opportunity to make certain that we are compliant with all local, state, and federal safety standards and regulations.

The United States Coast Guard (USCG) has recently made some changes to the requirements for portable (non-rechargeable) fire extinguishing equipment for recreational vessels "propelled or controlled by propulsion machinery" (these changes do not affect commercial vessels, including vessels carrying passenger for hire, and does not affect recreational vessels that do not use propulsion machinery) \*.

These new rules go into effect on April 20, 2022, and will relieve recreational vessel owners from the inspection, maintenance and recordkeeping requirements that emanated from the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) 10 Standard that was previously incorporated into the older USCG requirements. Specifically, rather than requiring monthly visual inspections, annual maintenance, and recordkeeping, the new USCG standard will regard a recreational vessel to be complying with the new rule if portable fire extinguishers are unexpired and not previously used, are on-board and readily accessible, are of an approved type ("Marine Type – USCG Approved" [Underwriters Labs approve fire extinguishers on behalf of the USCG]; 5-B:C/10-B/C (or greater) meet carriage requirements for all recreational vessels regardless of age [older type extinguishers may be kept if maintained]), in the appropriate quantity (based upon vessel size/engine size), and are in "good and serviceable" condition. The Coast Guard believes that this new rule will improve flexibility and eliminate burdensome recordkeeping requirements for recreational boat owners while maintaining safety, especially for vessels that may not be in use all year.

A determination as to whether the portable fire extinguisher remains current is determined by examining the digits (reflecting the year of manufacture) stamped on the bottom of the fire extinguisher – a valid date is defined as being within 12-years of the observed stamped date (must be removed from service on the 31<sup>st</sup> day of December of the 12<sup>th</sup> year).

Finally, this new rule clarifies that "good and serviceable" means that the portable fire extinguisher:

Is charged, and indicates it is charged if the extinguisher has a pressure gauge reading or indicator;

Has a pin lock that is firmly in place;

Does not show visible signs of significant corrosion or other damage; and

Has a discharge nozzle that is clean and free of obstructions

## Educational Officer's Report

In conjunction with the USPS Spring Annual Meeting held in Florida in February, the Educational Department issued a Consolidated Educational Department Report that was 16 pages long, mostly single spaced. The size of the report, I think, offers an indication of our national organization's emphasis on education. I also see evidence that National expects to continue with Internet courses, pre-recorded and available at any time to students signed up for the course, as well as virtual courses that are taught by a live instructor interacting with the students at a particular date and time. Both types of courses are presented online.

There seems to be a great deal of focus on changing the names of the courses. So, for example, the acronym of the On-the-Water Program has been changed from POTW to HOT (Hands on Training). Another change involves renaming "How to Use a Chart" to *Using Nautical Charts*. The course Bayside is currently offering, *Marine Navigation* has also undergone a name change from "Piloting." Additionally, there are efforts to speed delivery of ebooks, improve record keeping, provide ways to offer coupons and gift certificates, as well as refining other aspects of marketing.

Another focus of the education department is updating the curriculum and materials for many courses. *Engine Maintenance* has not been updated in over ten years so more current information is needed. The same is true for *Marine Communication Systems* and *Marine Electrical Systems*. Weather Forecasting has undergone many improvements since the course materials were created, so that topic needed updating as well. There has been new equipment for boating that will aid mariners in anticipating weather changes that needed to be covered too. The regulations and procedures for entering foreign ports, a topic covered in Cruise Planning, also needed to be updated.

The Sail course is being divided into two parts again, *Sailing* and *Advanced Sailing*, and updated. A new *Hot*, offering on-the water training in sailing, is also in the works. Another innovation is that the Simulator Project with the same menu of boating skills has been redesigned to work on laptops as well. In a test on a Zoom session, a remote user was able to control the keyboard. Further testing is ongoing to be able to use the Simulator with a gaming console. The software will eventually be available for download with a possible cost of \$70. Grant IX is funding the commercialization of this virtual trainer and the Coast Guard and Sea Scouts are very interested.

In general, the most notable change has been in the creation of more webinars and seminars.. There are five devoted to Weather alone in addition to the Weather course. Another webinar offering is *So you bought a boat, what now???*Other topics include Crossing Borders and Sailing on the Great Lakes. The list of videos promoting boating safety on *The Boating Channel* continues to grow.

Most of these projects are in the process of creation, so the USPS Educational Committee certainly has set an ambitious agenda for 2022.

## **Summer Sailstice 2022**



On June 18, 2022, the 21st Summer Sailstice will be held. The Sailstice is a global, annual celebration of sailing held on the weekend nearest the summer solstice. The Sailstice is free to all participants and has grown from 200 boats signed up in 2001 to almost 5,000 boats today with participation estimated as almost 19,000 annually.

The vision of the Summer Sailstice is to unite sailors worldwide to celebrate and share their passion for sailing by hosting "a spectacular weekend uniting and bonding a critical mass of sailors worldwide in a common, publicly visible, inspiring event to demonstrate and celebrate sailing, resulting in a significant, positive impact on participation."

In joining with Sailors for the Sea, an organization which unites sailors to protect the world's oceans, Summer Sailstice strives to inform and mobilize sailors, their families and communities to enjoy and conserve the beauty of the oceans while raising awareness of human impacts on the fragile marine environment and wildlife.

By celebrating sailing, Summer Sailstice helps the non-sailing world discover sailing, helps connect sailors and connects more people to each other and to caring for the oceans and waters upon which they sail.

Tallship, small ship, cruiser, racer, recreational - everyone is invited once a year to hoist sails and celebrate sailing 'together'. By doing so, sailors showcase the best of what sailing has to offer while giving us a chance to connect with the global sailing community, grow our sailing programs, race our one-design fleet and generally do what you enjoy best. With all of us doing it 'together' we also leverage our individual and organization efforts to offer the world a one-weekend snapshot of the sailing culture.

When you sign up or create an event you become part of a global demonstration of sailing - whether it's open to the public or a private sail, it gives an insight of the world of sailing. You can sign up your regular club event, create a special event or just go for a sail or win a **prize**. It's all about sharing one weekend of sailing 'together'.

There are a few events scheduled for our area. The Hempstead Bay Sailing Club in Island Park will participate with a race for all boats at their club. The race time will be predicated by the tide, and the course will be decided on the day, based on the wind and wind direction.

The City Island Capers will participate in a raft up near City Island in the Bronx.

A group call Sail Swim Eat will enjoy a great day on the Peconic.

## From the Safety Officer

# Fire!!

Of all the safety concerns when on the water, fire, sinking and falling overboard are our biggest fears. Of these unholy three, fire holds a special terror because it often causes everyone onboard to abandon ship, and then the boat itself usually burns to the waterline before sinking. I've written numerous *Running Lights* articles about the dangers of fire: when and where it often breaks out on a vessel, the dangers of refueling, the methods to prevent fire before it starts, and how to contain it when it does, but over the past month, there have been two dramatic fires at sea

mentioned here not because they teach us anything new about boat fires, but as a reminder of how prevalent and devastating fire can be onboard.



Last month, hundreds of people were rescued from a burning ferry near the Greek island of Corfu. Since the Euroferry *Olympia* is typical of the many vessels that annually transport millions of people and goods all over the Aegean Sea, it was full of passengers. Although most were saved, two people remained trapped in the ship's garage and at least another eleven are still missing and presumed dead.

On February 17th, the Portugese Navy sent patrol boats to the aid of the *Felicity Ace*, a large car carrier that left Emden Germany on the 10th and was scheduled to arrive in Davisville, Rhode Island the morning of February 23<sup>rd</sup>.



coast of the Azores after an unmanageable fire broke out in one of the cargo decks. The ship announced that it was "not under command" shortly afterwards as all of the 22 crew members escaped safely in a lifeboat, leaving the burning *Ace* to continue its death spiral. A week later, the drifting ship sank in the Atlantic taking with it her very expensive cargo -- **over \$700 million worth of luxury cars** – 189 Bentleys, 21 Lamborghinis, and an unspecific number of Audis, and Volkswagens. The Bentleys and Lamborghinis were special order, one-off cars (several in the multi-million dollar price range) leaving unhappy 1% toy buyers who had paid for and expected delivery last week, and manufacturers who now have to eat the costs of the loss and remake all

those automobiles. All I can say is that somebody's insurance premium just went through the roof!!

The point of these two sad examples is that fire is a constant threat on the water. It happens everywhere and all the time. If a ship with fire containment systems adequate to protect \$700 million in cargo can sink in flames, then every boat is at risk. The point is that since Bayside members are now preparing to commission their boats for the season, it's time to be very aggressive in making sure that all fuel lines, electrical lines, propane connections are secure, and that our fire extinguishers are up to date and up to the task of keeping us safe. You know what to do, so do it, because as is always the case .........




