

Executive Officer's Report

Onward! Through the Fog!...

Regardless of whether one plans to set sail for a brief day trip or a multi-day excursion, sudden changes in weather and ambient temperatures can increase the chances of encountering conditions of poor visibility (in day or night) and fog. Knowing how to confidently navigate these conditions will ensure safe passage to your destination:

Step 1: Slow down; keep a sharp lookout and listen for approaching vessels;

Step 2: Make yourself known to approaching vessels/learn what other vessels are signaling⁴:

if you are a power vessel making way, sound one prolonged blast every 2 minutes;

if you are a power vessel not making way (or stopped), sound two prolonged blasts, each separated by 2 seconds, and repeat every 2 minutes;

if you are a sailing vessel, sound 3 blasts (1 prolonged, followed by 2 short[§]) every 2 minutes; these same sound signals would also apply if your vessel is not under command or is a vessel restricted in its ability to maneuver, or is engaged in fishing or towing/pushing; if you hear this signal followed immediately by 4 blasts (1 prolonged followed by 3 short blasts), you are encountering a tow of more than one vessel, the second signal emanating from the last manned towed vessel in the string;

if you are at anchor in a location that is not a designated special anchorage, ring your bell rapidly for 5 seconds at intervals of 1 minute. If you are a larger vessel (≥ 100m in length), ringing the bell in the forepart of the vessel should be followed by ringing of a gong rapidly for 5 seconds in the after part of the vessel. In addition, a vessel at anchor may sound three blasts (1 short, 1 prolonged, 1 short) to give warning of her position and of the possibility of collision to an approaching vessel;

if you hear four short blasts, you are encountering a pilot vessel on duty assisting a larger vessel into port;

Vessels less than 20 meters are not required to use the above bell signals, however, such vessels would, under the appropriate circumstances, be required to make some other efficient sound signal at intervals of not more than 2 minutes

Finally, before venturing out, make sure your vessel has a functioning VHF radio, that your vessel can detect and (ideally) also transmit an AIS signature and consider equipping your vessel with a radar reflector and/or radar system. Many modern VHF radios can also be attached to hailers and are pre-programmed to activate sound signals for the specific circumstances of your vessel and environment. If you are interested in honing your skills in using any of these technologies, consider attending a course offered by the United Power Squadrons on these topics!

Educational Officer's Report

In spite of the pandemic, Bayside has continued offering a robust educational program. This spring, 22 people enrolled in the Marine Navigation course. Unfortunately some people had to postpone completion of the course because of personal issues. Several students who were unable to take the exam at this time have expressed an interest in it a later date. All in all, it is a positive result considering it was our first attempt to teach *Marine Navigation* (formerly *Piloting*) as a virtual course. We did conduct several in-person sessions to help students struggling with the process of charting and labeling a course. Thus, it also was our first try at offering a blended course, partially virtual and partially in-person. Thanks to Gil Allen and Gene Molteni who accepted the challenge of learning to use the presentation tools for remote learning and did a great job.

Sean Donohoe has been presenting the ABC course virtually for several sessions. At the last session, five students took and completed the course successfully. Sean is returning to in-person presentation of the ABC course at the Williamsburg Yacht Club this month.

Educational plans for the the rest of 2922 include offering Advanced Marine Navigation in September. It will be a blended course, virtual and in-person. if there is a demand, we also will hold a *Seamanship* course that consists of fivw different seminars with a final exam at the end.

During the summer, we plan to offer three seminars including the new *Weather Forecasting* seminar that should be of interest to all boaters. We also plan to offer several on site in-person presentations such as we conducted last year at Capri Marina and the Port Washington Yacht Club. They were brief, vey targeted and practical training sessions that proved popular and resulted in several boater signing up for our advanced courses.

Bayside remains committed to delivering boating education and adapts as needed to the demands of the changing times.

FLEET WEEK NEW YORK 2022 WILL AGAIN BE CELEBRATED MAY 25-31



After two long years, in person Fleet Week is back!

Since 1984, Fleet Week New York has been an annual tradition in New York City. This celebration allows Sailors, Marines and Coast Guard members the opportunity to experience the city while giving the citizens of New York and the surrounding areas the opportunity to witness firsthand the capabilities of today's maritime services.

The history of Fleet Week New York dates back to when Richard W. Scheuing, former President of the New York Council, happened to visit San Francisco at a time when their own Fleet Week celebration was occurring. He was so moved by its impact that, when he returned to New York, he played an integral role in ensuring that this celebration be brought to the city.

An extremely patriotic activity, Fleet Week is fittingly scheduled during the week of Memorial Day. Multiple ships and more than 2,000 members of the sea services are set to visit the five boroughs between May 25 and May 31, 2022. The week-long event will include public ship visitations, a variety of military demonstrations and a mix of new events and member favorites like the Richard & Doris Scheuing CO-XO Reception.

A range of New York venues host the weeklong itinerary of events for Fleet Week, including Miller Field on Staten Island, Central Park, New York Harbor, Fort Hamilton, South Street Seaport, Washington Square Park, Pier 88, Pier 86, Times Square and more.

USCG Cutter Penobscot Bay will be docked at the Intrepid Museum's Pier 86 on Saturday and Sunday (10am-5pm) and members of the U.S. Coast Guard will be on hand to answer questions about the cutter, a 140-foot Bay-class icebreaking tug, which will be on display through Monday.

The U.S. Marine Corps will also be onsite with vehicles (including restored and antique military vehicles), gear, equipment and more and visitors will be able to train like a Marine with a variety of demos and activities.

For Memorial Day on Monday, starting at 11am, the museum will host its annual Memorial Day ceremony with special guest speakers, the unfurling of a 100-ft American flag, and a wreath-laying ceremony.

Despite the impression created by a certain episode of Sex and the City, Fleet Week isn't only an opportunity for single ladies to meet attractive sailors. It's also a chance to watch the parade of ships and huge aircraft carriers, enormous warships, and historic boats. And then there's the demonstration of today's maritime services' capabilities. And, of course, the Flagship Brewery's Fleet Week Music Festival where you can enjoy the music of local bands, dance, and buy a pint of beer for an officer. Don't forget to thank them for their service to our county.



During our last in-person Fleet Week in 2019, about 103,000 people took tours of ships moored throughout the city or saw aircraft displays at various parks and schools. Here's to breaking that record in 2022!

Avoid Running Aground

One of the great unknowns of careful navigation is determining what lies beneath the water's surface. Unfortunately, using our 'seaman's eye' is of limited help since a patch of reeds or a rock formation poking their heads out at low tide is one of the few examples of being able to visualize above the waterline the danger that lies under it. What to do when run aground was detailed in earlier articles, so for now, I'd like us to concentrate on ...

How to Avoid Running Aground

Getting stuck in bottom mud, sand, or rocks poses a number of serious problems. If you are lucky, you can float away at high tide or be pulled to safety by another boat. But there are other times when there are no simple solutions, and where you and your vessel are in life-threatening trouble. The sea can be merciless against a vessel stuck hard on the bottom. Waves and wind don't stop just because you have, as evidenced by the fate of the 1930s proud flagship of the United States Lines, the *S.S. America* that started its elegant life in 1939 and ended hard put in the Canary Islands while being towed to the breakers in 1994. She succumbed to the unremitting grind of waves smashing her against the rocks, and within two years, this was what was left of America's once-great liner. She survived WWII, but not running aground.

Finding yourself stuck is not inevitable, nor is it a badge of honor for the seasoned boater; that "everybody runs aground" meme I've heard too often. The way to avoid this is, as everything in boating safety, to always proceed with caution. Never assume that you'll have enough distance under your keel to get by. Assume that you will NOT have enough water, and alter your course accordingly. And since our eye is of little help, we need to rely on chart/course preparation before leaving the dock, and paying strict attention to our electronics while underway:

- **Study your charts in detail** low water numbers mean just that, so be conservative in subtracting a few feet just in case that area has changed since it was charted
- **Keep a close watch on your sonar** except for the madhouse up and down bottom terrain of Hell Gate or the occasional rock formation, watching an increasing decrease in depth from your sonar can let you know that you are headed towards ground. Stop, change course, or come about when it's clear that continuing ahead might lead to problems.
- Know exactly how many feet of water you need under your keel and never shortchange that measure of safety. Get regular updates from the US Coast Guard as to navigational changes when Hurricane Sandy hit a few years ago, the bottom landscape on vast areas of the Sound and the Hudson River changed dramatically. Since there were silt banks, sunken vessels, and debris where there was once open water, pre-Sandy charts needed to be notated/updated to reflect the new reality.

Grounding is a greater problem that most of us realize, particularly in commercial marine traffic. The Evergreen Line might be more aptly named the **EverGround Line** since last year, one of its container ships got lodged crossways on the Suez Canal and bottled up shipping for over a month, and in March 2022, another hapless EveryGround ran onto the bottom mid-Chesapeake Bay.










From the Safety Officer

In other words, finding yourself hard aground is more common that most of us realize, but just because it happens all the time – **DON'T let it happen to you!** It's not always avoidable, but this is a clear case of the ever-true, age-old adage of **Better Safe than Sorry**.




